The Cubelets Kit allows users to learn to build a basic robot using magnetic cubes that interact with each other and their environment. Easy to use and a fun way to learn. Ideal for adults and kids ages six and up. Engaging and intuitive, Cubelets are an easy way to design robots. Kits include 16 Cubelets that sense, think, and act, a handbook, and a getting started guide.

EXPLORE NEW WORLDS WITH VIRTUAL REALITY

Kids! Join us as we build, create, and explore on LEGO Play Day, every Tuesday from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.


A MONTH OF PROGRAMS HIGHLIGHT CATCH-22 IN SIERRA MADRE

Catch-22, by Joseph Heller, is the 2019 selection for Sierra Madre Public Library’s annual One Book One City program in February. One of the most significant novels of the twentieth century, the satire on war and bureaucracy is set during World War II and follows John Yossarian, a U.S. Army Air Force B-25 bombardier and his experiences as he tries to maintain his sanity while fulfilling his service requirements so he can go home.

Joseph Heller was an American author of novels, short stories, plays and screen-plays. His best-known work is the novel Catch-22.

One Book, One City is a nation-wide community reading program that invites everyone in a city to read and discuss the same book.





READER'S REVIEW

Spain in Our Hearts: Americans in the Spanish Civil War, 1936-1939

Albert Camus gave Hochschild his title when he wrote "... men of my generation have Spain in our hearts. It was in Spain that men learned that we can be right and yet be beaten, that force can vanquish spirit, that there are times when courage is not its own reward. It is this doubtless which explains why so many men regarded the Spanish drama as a personal tragedy."

What was Spain doing in some American hearts between 1936 and 1939? In this brilliantly written work, Hochschild offers an American take on what was the bloodiest rehearsal for the Second World War. While official American policy was that of strict neutrality, roughly 3,000 American men and women volunteered for the International Brigade, Abraham Lincoln division; 900 volunteers died in Spain. Americans were not alone on the Spanish slaughter bench of history: more than 35,000 volunteers from 50 nations comprised the International Brigades suffering roughly 15,000 deaths. In short, Spain was a bloody mess.

You remember learning from your high school teachers that the democratically elected Second Spanish Republic (1931-1939) proved incapable of governing itself. In July 1936, General Francisco Franco and his Spanish Moroccan troops invaded Spain on German planes to bring order to the state. Abetted by German and Italian fascist troops and material, Franco and his Nationalist sympathizers engaged the Spanish Republic and its Loyalists, in a war that would leave more than 450,000 dead. The USSR was the only state which supported the Spanish Republicans with arms and soldiers but its assistance paled with that of the fascist powers.

So, what inspired nearly 3,000 heartfelt Americans to the Spanish cause? A sense of democratic idealism, argues Hochschild, especially in opposition to German and Italian intervention. Hochschild's account of Americans in Spain differs from other historical accounts of the Spanish trauma is his focus on the lives of specific individuals, some unknown, some well-known, who carry his narrative. The words of Ernest Hemmingway, Martha Gellhorn, and other, lesser known journalists such as Lois Orr, Louis Fischer, and Virginia Cowles bore witness to American volunteers in their articles.

But Hochschild's case for American hearts and idealism in Spain comes in his exploration of barely known persons. Illustrative of these lives are the Merrimans, Robert and Marion. A graduate student in economics at the University of California, Berkeley, Robert won a fellowship to the USSR in 1934 to study Soviet agriculture. By late 1936, the Merrimans were in Spain where Robert became a major in the Abraham Lincoln Brigade; no stranger to military thought and training, Merriman was a ROTC graduate and a commissioned officer. In Spain, Merriman fought bravely, leading a brigade skillfully; for his efforts, he was seriously wounded and hospitalized in February 1937; he died in action in April 1938. Some scholars posit that Robert Merriman may have been the model for Robert Jordan, university professor turned soldier in Hemmingway's *For Whom the Bell Tolls*.

Hochschild has published eight works of non-fiction and countless articles. In *Spain in Our Hearts*, he has written a moving, unforgettable history.
