Build, create, and explore on LEGO Play Day, <u>every Tuesday</u> from 2:00 – 5:00 p.m.




THIRD THURSDAY BOOK CLUB

ONE BOOK ONE CITY COMING IN FEBRUARY

<u>Catch-22</u>, by Joseph Heller, is the Library's One Book One City selection for February. First published in 1961, <u>Catch-22</u> is one of the most significant novels of the 20th century. Joseph Heller was an American author of novels, short stories, plays and screenplays and his best-known work is a satire on war and bureaucracy.



Scheduled programs will be:

Saturday, February 2 at 1:00 p.m. — A Look at Joseph Heller and His Work — by Rich Procter, at the Library. Rich Procter is Senior Writer for BRC Imagination Arts. He started as a comedy radio disc jockey and resident member of the Groundlings Improv troupe, and was a contributing writer to A Prairie Home Companion. "There are many writers who can juggle comedy and drama," says Rich. "Heller is one of the very few who can juggle farce and tragedy. That's why this astonishing novel is still in print and seems as fresh as the day it was released in 1961."

Monday, February 4 at 7:00 p.m. — *Sierra Madre Playhouse "Off the Page"* — full reading of the stage adaption of <u>Catch-22</u>, directed by new Playhouse Associate Artistic Director C. Julian White, at the Sierra Madre Playhouse.

Saturday, February 16 at 1:00 p.m. — World Premiere of "The Cold Blue" HBO documentary about the making of "Memphis Belle" — filmmaker Erik Nelson has produced a documentary, "The Cold Blue," that will be shown on HBO this spring. In 1944, William Wyler made a documentary for the US War Department called "Memphis Belle," the record of a B-17 bomber crew's 25th mission. Nelson interviewed the last surviving B-17 pilots about what it was like to fly bomber missions in WWII and cut Wyler's raw footage to support the moving interviews. Ideal for adults and kids ages six and up. Engaging and intuitive, Cubelets are an easy way to design robots. Kits include 16 Cubelets that sense, think, and act, a handbook, and a getting started guide.

READER'S REVIEW

Books for Cooks -- Several Short Reviews for Your Reading and Cooking Pleasure

As the weather turns frosty with night's drawing in, baking goodies and experimenting with recipes replaces reading as a pastime. This time of year, I have great cooking memories! My late mother, Carole Enmark, was an excellent cook, in fact her degree was in "Home Economics" and she wrote cookbooks as well. Past holidays of mine and my husband were spent in Wales, where I cooked complete meals on a wood burning stove, attempting to convert recipes from US imperial measurements to UK metric. FUN. This activity (from a wannabe domestic goddess) used to seriously cut into my reading time - hence I thought it appropriate to combine the love of both cooking and books to provide you with an overview of a few fun books that are memoirs, and one novel, that have recipes included.

First up is <u>A Thousand Days in Venice</u> by Marlena di Blasi. This romantic memoir is an account of Marlena's adventure, i.e., packing up her life in the states to marry a Venetian. She and her man move from Venice to Tuscany, finally settling in Umbria. She was an editor



of Bon Appetit, is a serious chef, and sprinkles her passionate memoirs with favorite Italian recipes. Her husband loves the fried Zucchini flowers best. YUM! Check out the companion volume <u>A Thousand Days in Tuscany</u> and hopefully the Library will buy her latest: The Lady in the Palazzo.

Donna in our Library recommended that I read *Cooking for Mr. Latte* by Amanda Hesser which is a food lover's courtship. Amanda is a restaurant critic in New York and food snob, however, her memoir is delightful as she converts her fiancé from regular Joe to 'Grand



Gourmand.' The recipes are to die for. Follow this book up with *Eat Cake!*, a novel by Jeanne Ray, which is a story of troubles in the family, with cake as therapy. It was not the best book I've ever read, however each chapter finished with a truly delectable cake recipe.
