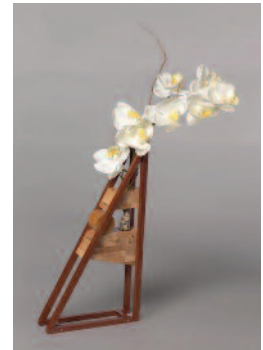
## 57TH ANNUAL SIERRA MADRE ART FAIR

The 57<sup>th</sup> Annual Sierra Madre Art Fair, sponsored by the Friends of the Sierra Madre Library, will be held in Memorial Park, 222 West Sierra Madre Blvd., on **Saturday, May 4**, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., and **Sunday, May 5**, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Sixty-five (65) artists, including 10 newly juried, will display and sell their works of art. Mediums include oil paintings, jewelry, watercolors, glass, wood, metal, wearable art, photography, pottery, ceramics, mixed media, sculpture and weaving. The Art Fair will be the perfect place to buy Mom that wonderful Mother's Day gift or to buy upcoming graduation and wedding gifts, as well as to purchase pieces for your own enjoyment.

The Featured Artist this year is **Warren Yip**. His Maple and Balau wood piece, titled 'Giraffe,' will appear on all posters, post cards, flyers, and other promotional materials.

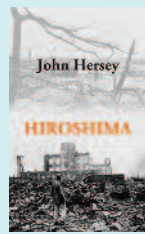
## BOARD DEVELOPMENT

## READER'S REVIEW

*Hiroshima*  
By John Hersey



The *New Yorker* magazine published *Hiroshima* in late August 1946; a few weeks later it appeared as a 120-page

book; since then, *Hiroshima* has never been out of print. Less than a week ago, I walked through the Peace Memorial Museum in Hiroshima noting Hersey's work prominently for sale among the few English language books available. And no wonder: *Hiroshima* was the first accessible account of the bomb's destruction and remains revered for its humanizing account of six persons who survived the August 6, 1945, 8:15 a.m. explosion of the atomic bomb.

In May, 1946, Hersey spent three weeks finding and interviewing survivors; six lives emerged as carriers of the author's story: two Japanese physicians, a German Jesuit priest, a young, widowed Japanese mother of three children, a Japanese Methodist minister, and a young, office worker. These figures provide us the personal details of the morning of August 6, and the hours, days, and months following the explosion.

If the individuals give us the details of the event, numbers provide us with the bigger picture of the atomic blast – the number of fatalities, the number of wounded, the immediate and long-term death-sentences from radiation poisoning, the destruction of the built environment. Knitting the detail with the general, though, is the measured pace – the gift—of Hersey's prose. Hersey described his work as "deliberatively quiet."

Some readers grumped that the author did not explore the moral/ethical consequences of the American use of the bomb; still others took issue with the absence of any exegesis on the tactical, soldier-preserving reasons the United States bet on the atomic bomb, both at Hiroshima and Nagasaki on August 9<sup>th</sup>, as war shortening acts; both are fair critiques. But by my reckoning, Hersey's purpose was to humanize those who survived the bomb. *Hiroshima*, then, must be considered as the first brick in the wall of memory of the use of atomic weapons. That memory, Hersey later argued, has been a crucial element in the case against atomic weapons.

*Hiroshima* reveals Hersey's life experiences. Born in China, son of a Methodist missionary, Hersey's first language was Chinese. As a war correspondent during the Second World War, he covered the Pacific and European theaters. He landed in Sicily with Patton in July 1943 and was on Guadalcanal helping evacuate wounded troops, a bravery that earned him a commendation from the Secretary of the Navy.

Hersey's life and work attracted notice. The Pulitzer was his for *A Bell for Adano* (1944), a novel about American occupation of a small Sicilian town; *The Wall* (1950) described the Warsaw Ghetto winning him the National Jewish Book Award. High schools carry his name as do endowments at his *alma mater*, Yale University. In 2008, the US Postal Service issued a stamp honoring Hersey, an acknowledgment of one whose life and work as a war correspondent contributed to our understanding of humanity *in extremis*.
