There will be several community input meetings in October and November. Please stay posted on these upcoming dates.

Our 50/50 raffle and lemonade donations made nearly \$400 since the winner of the raffle donated their portion back to the Friends. Thank you!

Also very active, was the committee of the **Best Used Book Sale** with a "Back to School" Theme on August 2 and 3. **Martha Troedson** and Friends braved the 100+ degree heat to conduct this sale. It was extremely successful. Thank you to all of our volunteers for making this happen.

FRIENDS ANNUAL MEETING AND DINNER

On Wednesday, June 19, the Friends of the Sierra Madre Library held their annual meeting and volunteer appreciation dinner at Sierra Madre United Methodist Church.

The dinner, themed <u>"Soaring to New Heights,"</u> was attended by over 60 community members, including Board Members, Trustees, City Officials, Volunteers and Guests.

President **Margaret Quigley** welcomed participants, made introductions and expressed gratitude to all the volunteers who make the Library such a vibrant part of the community.

Christine Smart, City Librarian, thanked the Friends, City Council and Library Staff for their continued support and specifically acknowledged Staff on their dedication to providing excellent customer service.

Shannon King, Chair of the Library Trustees, thanked Patricia Hall for her leadership and wisdom. She also thanked the Friends for the many years of financial support of the Library and concluded by acknowledging the Partners Program.

Patricia Hall, Sierra Madre Library Foundation, reported they are waiting for finalization of the 501 (c) 3 status. Brochures will be coming out in July and in late August the Trustees will be making presentations at schools. The RFP is complete and is going to an architect. Toni Buckner will chair the panel for interviews and the Foundation, Friends and Trustees will make up the panel.

Volunteer Recognition — Margaret introduced Darlene Traxler, Sharon Murphy, Martha Troedson and Leslie Ziff, and asked that they speak about the volunteers who served this year for our fundraising events.

Margaret spoke of the death of Treasurer **Sandra Dickey**, and said that financial accounting had been delayed, but that we looked to be on budget.

Beth Smith-Kellock, Partners Program Chair, recognized those Partners in attendance and thanked them for their continued support. She gave a brief explanation of the Program stating that membership levels range from \$100 to \$500+ and is an <u>annual</u> contribution separate from a Friends membership. READER'S REVIEW

This month's review is by **Tom Tomlinson**

The Library Book
by Susan Orlean

How timely is the appearance of \underline{The} $\underline{Library\ Book}$ for any community like

Sierra Madre whose Library opened in 1887, 20 years before the city incorporated! Orlean's splendidly crafted homage to libraries throughout the world but especially in the United States and in Los Angeles is an act of extraordinary research, detail, knitted together by moving prose of wit and love; throughout *Library Book*, she reminds us why libraries matter.

For Orlean, libraries are institutions of remembrance, order, and, as they are admission free, they foster a "publicness" not always discovered in contemporary society. By remembrance, she understands the preservation of the past and discussions of the future; by order, the organization of the collection in ways that are made accessible to the public—think the Dewey Decimal System and subsequent organizing systems; and, advancing the idea of the publicness of libraries argues for an institution open to all persons.

Exploring the author's argument for the nature of libraries, I settled in recently at one of the six tables in the adult section of the Sierra Madre Library at 3:30 p.m. Here's what I saw: a gray-haired couple reading newspapers; a retired math tutor working with two middle-school girls on their homework, one girl was Caucasian, the other Asian; a black South African graduate student working at his computer on a research paper; a middle-aged woman eyeing the one dollar book sale; two fifty plus year old men at separate tables, each working with books and their computers; three Latinas playing a lively board game; and, me, a 75 year old book reviewer for the Sierra Madre Public Library wondering if Orlean's assertion for the publicness and diversity of libraries might hold water in our own building. By my reckoning, Orlean had it right; if she is recruiting acolytes for social inclusivity, I'm in.

Libraries as institutions of inclusion may be the "ueber" wrap for Orlean's argument, it is intermixed with three other narratives, all indigenous to southern California: creation of the Goodhue-designed L.A. Library building constructed in 1926; biographs of the skein of men and women who were the city's librarians from its first, the 18 year old Mary Foy to the present, with plenty of words aimed at the eccentric Charles Lummis — Harvard drop out, cultural warrior on behalf of Native Americans and Spanish culture, author, advocate for the Southwest Museum and all-around intellectual gadfly. And then there was the April 29, 1986 fire which burned for more than seven hours at temperatures that reached 2,000 degrees leaving 400,000 books as ash and another 700,000 damaged by fire, heat, and water. The chief suspect as arsonist was Harry Peak, a loopy, wanna be actor now deceased whose presence in the library—or not—on the morning of the fire continues to haunt professional and amateur fire sleuths to this day.

<u>The Library Book</u> has already attracted a film contract. The author will deliver a lecture at The Huntington Library—where else—in November.
