58TH ANNUAL SIERRA MADRE ART FAIR FEATURED ARTIST HAS BEEN SELECTED

The Friends of the Sierra Madre Public Library are proud to announce that the Featured Artist for the 58th Annual Sierra Madre Art Fair is **Suzanne Kustner**.

Suzanne holds a BA degree in Education with a minor in Art from California State University, Los Angeles, and has taught enameling at Creative Arts Group

in Sierra Madre since 1979. She also was an art consultant for the Duarte School District for 10 years.

She began her enameling career in 1970 and has taken classes and studied with many internationally known enamelists. Suzanne is a member of the National Enamelist Society and several regional guilds. She has won numerous awards for her work, including exhibiting in the prestigious National Silver Competition sponsored by the major silver companies in the United States. She participated in the celebrated 1993 'Year of the American Craftsman.' Her enamels were displayed in the Fine Arts Building of the L.A. County Fair and she was chosen to be one of the demonstrating artists in the main hall.

Her enamels have been chosen to be included 5 times in the National Enameling Society's biannual Juried Exhibitions.

More recently, 2 of her enamels were included in the 2009 Lark Book '500 Enameled Objects' and her gold beads were also included in the 2014 Lark Book '1000 Beads.'

Suzanne participates in several Art Festivals during the year – The Friends of the Sierra Madre Library's Annual Sierra Madre Art Fair and Creative Arts Group Annual Art Festival.

Her work can presently be seen on display and for sale at: The Freehand Gallery in Los Angeles; The National Ornamental Metal Museum in Memphis, TN; ACCI Gallery in Berkeley, CA., and The Jamison Gallery at Creative Arts Group in Sierra Madre, CA.

Suzanne continues to teach enameling at Creative Arts Group.

This year's Art Fair is being held in Memorial Park on **Saturday, May 2**, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., and **Sunday, May 3**, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Be sure to stop by Suzanne's booth (#9) to admire and purchase her inspiring creations.

BEST USED BOOK SALE

The February Book Sale earned \$2,050.70. Added to our presales of \$1,538.08 from the Library cart and the Internet, <u>we have earned a total of</u> **\$3,575.78** since the December sale. The next Book Sale will be **Friday, April 3** and **Saturday, April 4** and will feature Half Price on Gardening, Cooking and Decorating books.

Many people have asked how we dispose of leftover books from our sales. Due to the volume of material we receive, we can only keep what's left in the Basement and the small paperbacks from the parking lot. That means we have about 500-700 books we need to dispose of after each sale. We donate left-over children's books to Hope Gardens (a shelter run by the Union Rescue Mission) and to a ministry which services agencies in South-Central L.A. In addition, The Last Bookstore in Los Angeles comes after the sale to pick up what's left and they distribute books to various charities, schools, and agencies. We also have made smaller donations to various local groups such as the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and PTAs. Look for a "Little Free Library" to open soon in Goldberg Park, organized by local Girl Scouts and stocked with our books!

Thank you for the wonderful gently-used donations. We couldn't sustain these earnings without them! See you at the sale in April.

READER'S REVIEW

This month's review is by **Catherine Addé**

Becoming

by Michelle Obama

While on a small expedition ship plying the waters of the Pacific Northwest, I noticed a fellow traveler deeply engrossed reading this 2018 memoir. I don't usually ask strangers to share their opinions about the book they are currently reading, but I figured we were 'kin' of sorts, traveling on the same ship. I felt compelled to ask this Man what he thought. He looked up, smiled wanly, and stated that he was a staunch Republican. I waited for him to berate all things not Republican, or at least have a go at the Obama administration, when he surprised me. "This is by far one of the most finely written autobiographies I've ever read. And I've read a lot. She's a fantastic wordsmith."

I promptly added the book to my Goodreads list (if you've not joined Goodreads, I highly recommend it). Since 2006, I've been contributing book reviews for the Friends of the Library's newsletter. I bring this up to share with you my well-read friend Nancie's thoughts on book reviews.

She said: "Please do not tell me most of the story in your book review." (Lately I've read them myself – and I think *Why bother reading the book now? The reviewer just told me all about it!* It's similar to the feeling I get when watching movie trailers and they are so long and detailed that I no longer want to see the movie. Right?) She states: "I want to know, from the Reviewer's standpoint, what the story or memoir is going to DO for me. How is it going to make me feel? What life lessons can I learn from it, if any. Will it make me laugh, cry, or evoke any other emotion? Dear Reviewer, please do not give me a blow by blow recap of the book. I know how to read."

That said, I present to you my review:

Michelle Obama's life story satisfied my curiosity, revealing a glimpse into what its really like to live in the White House, raise children there, balance a marriage with politics, develop a thick skin against the critics. She reminds us there is no job description for First Lady; and recounts the joy of developing successful programs that promote education and the fight against obesity among our nation's youth. She made me feel proud of our American heritage with the knowledge that even with her modest background, her story could become anyone's story. Hence the title: *Becoming*. She became, with the support from loving parents who, against the odds, helped her rise through the academic world. She became a corporate Lawyer entering a world which is not traditionally dominated by women and especially not men or women of color. In part two titled: Becoming Us, she shared stories about courtship and how she met the man she'd marry. Becoming parents, they were overjoyed at the prospect of raising two daughters, accepting the challenge of balancing their careers with family life. Becoming More, in part three, is her Husband's political role which ultimately led her to become a Campaigner for him, then First Lady of the United States. There are countless stories here of all stages in her incredible life, some funny, some heartbreaking, many relatable. This is so richly written that within these pages, she takes us along with her - revealing heartfelt candor, grace, intelligence, wit. Add to that a humble spirit and a down to earth, no nonsense personality. This is precisely why my previously mentioned fellow traveler liked her style of writing. I agree! I wanted to imagine that Michelle Obama could have been sitting across the room with me, in a comfy overstuffed armchair, cup of tea in hand, just talking. Two people: Becoming Friends.
