A LETTER FROM THE CITY LIBRARIAN

Dear Library Friends and Supporters,

As we work together staying "Safer at Home," the Library has made critical adaptations to our services. On Thursday, March 12, the Library and all City Services closed to the public while we devised a plan for offering services to the community. The following week, extremely limited services were made available.

In an effort to continue supporting our patrons during this difficult time, the Sierra Madre Public Library will offer a single, over the phone checkout per patron. To the extent to which we can, a Library Staff Member will take patron requests for materials over the phone, and materials will be checked out to the member's card and prepared for pick up. Upon arriving at the Library, patrons will call from a designated waiting area outside of the building, and a staff member will check their identification and transfer materials to them, in keeping with social distancing standards.

We at the Sierra Madre Public Library believe that everyone has the right to access materials and information; however, this opportunity will be revoked out of a greater concern for the Sierra Madre Community and City Staff, should the need arise.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE


There are still a few positions available for Directors at Large for the Friends of the Sierra Madre Library Board of Directors, and we also will need a chair for next year's Art Fair.

READER'S REVIEW

<u>Tattoos On The Heart:</u> <u>The Power of Boundless</u> <u>Compassion</u>

by Gregory Boyle

Barking to the Choir: The Power of Radical Kinship, this year's selection for Sierra Madre's One Book One City program, whetted my appetite for Gregory Boyle's previous book, <u>Tattoos On The Heart</u>, which turned out to be the better of the two. Since 1988, Boyle has run Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles, the world's largest gang-intervention and rehabilitation program. With its bakery, café, counseling operations, job placement agency and gang tattoo removal service, Homeboy helps gang members find a better life.

In these pages, Boyle, a Jesuit priest, tells the story of how and why he founded Homeboy and recounts some of his many interactions with the "homies" from the East L.A. housing projects, who call him G or G-Dog. To Boyle, a homie's life has as much value as any celebrity's. He challenges readers to "stand in awe at what the poor have to carry rather than standing in judgment at how they carry it." They're society's outcasts, from dysfunctional families, with abusive, addicted or absent parents. You'll be introduced to people you would never otherwise encounter. From moving vignettes in which even the most hardened homies burst into tears upon discovering that they're worthy of compassion, to moments of light banter between Boyle and the homies, sometimes in the distinctive Spanish dialect of East L.A., Boyle makes a convincing case for the sacredness of every life. He gives voice to those he calls "the powerless and the voiceless." His anecdotes about the homies are interspersed with his spiritual reflections, along with quotations from a variety of theologians, poets and literary figures.

Boyle's stories are both heartwarming and heartbreaking, full of both triumph and tragedy. At Homeboy Industries, former enemies from rival gangs learn to work together and even become friends. But Boyle has also officiated at many funerals of homies who were in the process of turning their lives around when they got caught in the literal crossfire and became victims of gang violence.

At times, you may find yourself overcome with emotion while reading, just as Boyle was while telling some of his stories during a recent speaking engagement in Sierra Madre. The audience reacted accordingly. As the old show business saying goes, there wasn't a dry eye in the house.

With the Library temporarily closed during the coronavirus pandemic, you'll have to buy this book to read it. But since all the proceeds from its sales go to support Homeboy Industries, you'll be contributing to a worthy cause. While you're at it, pick up some extra copies for family and friends. Social distancing gives everyone more time to read.
