
MARY TUMILTY FUND

READER'S REVIEW

And Then All Hell Broke Loose: Two Decades In The Middle East

by Richard Engel

Regular NBC and MSNBC viewers have seen Richard Engel, Chief Foreign Correspondent for NBC News, covering the fight against COVID-19 in Europe, venturing into ICUs while wearing Personal Protective Equipment to avoid infection. Before that, he spent twenty years reporting on a different kind of struggle: war, terrorism and social upheaval in the Middle East, as described in this book.

After graduating from Stanford in 1996, Engel moved to the Middle East to become a reporter. He was freelancing for Arab news sources when a busload of Italian tourists were massacred at a Cairo museum. This was his first view of the carnage in the region, some of which he later experienced himself, in a series of close calls. While embedded with the US military in Iraq, he survived a series of IED explosions. His Baghdad hotel was shaken by a truck bomb exploding across the street, and he was kidnapped in Syria. "My ambition was to ride the train of history," he writes, "and the train came rumbling right at me."

His eyewitness descriptions of the bloodshed are graphic and gruesome: bodies of young boys killed in Lebanon during an Israeli air raid; "a stray dog carrying a severed human head between its teeth;" an interview with a 14-year-old boy who had a hand and a foot chopped off by ISIS because he had refused to cooperate with them

Unable to get a visa to travel to Iraq in 2003 but determined to cover the coming war, Engel entered the country by volunteering as a "human shield" for a peace organization and then made a deal to work for ABC News. He became the last American television reporter left in Baghdad. He describes the daily rhythms of life in Baghdad as the war turned increasingly violent and unpredictable: "Mortars at dawn, car bombs by 11 a.m., drive-by shootings before tea and mortars again at dusk."

Engel also gives his personal impressions of leaders. Saddam Hussein had "a terrifying gaze." Qaddafi seemed like "a washed-up, strung-out rock star." Mubarak had become "an old fool" surrounded by "generals in tight uniforms and civilian advisers in bad suits." Throughout the book, he supplies extensive historical context, to help readers understand the longstanding tribal and sectarian rivalries that have made the Middle East such a troubled region.

It remains to be seen whether Engel will write a book about how all hell broke loose while he reported on the war against COVID-19. Stay tuned.
