
This unique event could not have taken place without the Friends of the Library who contributed volunteers and refreshments and the Library Foundation!

ONE BOOK ONE CITY FOR FEBRUARY

This year's One Book One City selection is Humankind: A Hopeful History by Rutger Bregman. Rutger Bregman is a historian and an author, currently living in Holland. His work has been featured in The Washington Post, The Guardian and the BBC. He has been described by The Guardian as the "Dutch wunderkind of new ideas" and by TED Talks as "one of Europe's most prominent young thinkers." Humankind: A Hopeful History takes a multidisciplinary approach, drawing from the findings of history, economics, psychology, biology, anthropology and archaeology and presents ideas on how to provide a better future. According to Bregman, "So what is this radical idea? That most people, deep down, are pretty decent.'

GENERAL FUND DONATIONS


The Friends of the Sierra Madre Library <u>would like to thank</u> Helen Gronquist for her generous donation given to us in December.

READER'S REVIEW



This month's review is by Catherine Addé

<u>Humankind: A Hopeful History</u> By Rutger Bregman

Gentle readers – this is the choice from Sierra Madre Library's 'One Book One City' annual event. Every February, in case you didn't know, there are a myriad of programs that

enhance the theme of the chosen book that we read together as a city.

As I'm still reading it, I've not a finished review just yet — however I have to say it has grabbed me from the start. This young, best-selling author, has done an incredible amount of research to back up his premise: that we humans are hard wired to be helpful, good and kind to one another. He turns the notion on its head that we are all selfish and unkind.

My favourite chapter so far is about the real-life proof he found of youngsters stranded on an island that were helpful to one another, unlike the classic: 'Lord of the Flies' story where quite the opposite occurred. Who can forget the true events of Christmas in 1914, when soldiers on the western front laid down their arms for an informal 'kick about' – not quite a soccer match – but also enjoyed caroling and reveling on the frozen ground, trying to forget that during this war, they were supposed to be killing each other.

While I am still reading, I cannot say it any better than this Goodreads review:

"If one basic principle has served as the bedrock of bestselling author Rutger Bregman's thinking, it is that every progressive idea — whether it was the abolition of slavery, the advent of democracy, women's suffrage, or the ratification of marriage equality — was once considered radical and dangerous by the mainstream opinion of its time. With Humankind, he brings that mentality to bear against one of our most entrenched ideas: namely, that human beings are by nature selfish and self-interested.

By providing a new historical perspective of the last 200,000 years of human history, Bregman sets out to prove that we are in fact evolutionarily wired for cooperation rather than competition, and that our instinct to trust each other has a firm evolutionary basis going back to the beginning of Homo sapiens. Bregman systematically debunks our understanding of the Milgram electrical-shock experiment, the Zimbardo prison experiment, and the Kitty Genovese "bystander effect."

In place of these, he offers little-known true stories: the tale of twin brothers on opposing sides of apartheid in South Africa who came together with Nelson Mandela to create peace; a group of six shipwrecked children who survived for a year and a half on a deserted island by working together; a study done after World War II that found that as few as 15% of American soldiers were actually capable of firing at the enemy.

The ultimate goal of Humankind is to demonstrate that while neither capitalism nor communism has on its own been proven to be a workable social system, there is a third option: giving "citizens and professionals the means (left) to make their own choices (right)." Reorienting our thinking toward positive and high expectations of our fellow man, Bregman argues, will reap lasting success. Bregman presents this idea with his signature wit and frankness, once again making history, social science and economic theory accessible and enjoyable for lay readers."

Humankind is available at the temporary Library location now – and it is my hope that you'll be able to participate in the many events the committee has in store for you. Including a heartwarming 'Off the Page' reading at the Sierra Madre Playhouse with a feel-good story called: "In the Garden of the Selfish Giant" as well as enjoying this remarkable work, of course. Excuse me while I get back to reading it!
